
• <u>Prairie South Scholarships</u> will open Feb. 1. The deadline is Monday, May 1, at 5:00 pm. No late applications will be accepted. Apply early.



- Registration for the <u>Provincial Competition for Skills Canada Saskatchewan</u> is now open. There are well over 40 different areas in which to compete including construction, information technology, employment, manufacturing and engineering, services, and transportation. Check out the <u>Contest Descriptions</u> for more details. Events occur at different times, with the first on March 15, so get your registrations in as soon as possible. Learn more by going to <u>Skills Canada Saskatchewan</u>.
- Are you taking training for a trade for your post-secondary or are you entering the workforce in a trade? If so, you have only a short time to complete your <u>Sask. Youth Apprenticeship Challenges</u>. Doing SYA allows you to acquire 300 hours of trade time, free level 1 technical training (potentially saving nearly \$900), free registration (\$250 savings), and a shot at one of the 100 scholarships worth \$1000 across the province.
- Are you currently taking a gap year and looking for more structure, support and connections? Are you in your first year of college or university and finding that your year isn't going as planned? Consider <u>Discover Year</u>. Feb. 4 is the deadline to apply for the <u>Discover Year Winter/Spring Term 2024</u>. Click <u>here</u> to learn more.

- HURRY. Remember that most of Sask. Polytechnic's programs are <u>First Qualified</u>, <u>First Admitted</u> (<u>FQFA</u>) which means first come, first served, when you meet the minimum requirements. For current grade 12s, for many programs, the first opportunity to apply is Sept. 1, 2023. If you wait, the course may be full. Here is an <u>application guide</u> to assist you.
- Students 16-18 who are interested in volunteering in the health care field, consider the Volunteen Program where you would go into hospitals and health centres to spend time with patients and help health care professionals. Contact John Paul Hickie (306-630-7405).
- <u>Transcript Requests</u>: Grade 12 students who are applying to a post-secondary institution will need to send the institution an unofficial school transcript that lists the subjects they are taking in 2022-2023. They will also need to request that a <u>transcript from the Ministry of Education</u> be sent to that institution. There is a \$25 fee for the first five selections and \$2 per additional location in one sitting. Students should check off the following (see next) and make all requests in one sitting because it will cost \$25 each time you login and make the requests:

- Interested in health sciences? Saskatchewan has agreements with post-secondary institutions in other provinces to reserve seats for eligible Saskatchewan residents in specific health training programs not offered here. The programs include Respiratory Therapy, Nuclear Medicine, Diagnostic Medical Sonography (Ultrasound), Occupational Therapy, Magnetic Resonance Imaging (MRI), Cardiovascular Perfusion, Electroneurophysiology, and Prosthetics and Orthotics are offered in Alberta and BC schools. Have a look at the Health Science Fact Sheet for more information on health programs in and outside the province. Check out the expansion of the Health Training Program Opportunities.
- Unsure of what you wish to do after grade 12? Consider <u>Discover Year</u>, an innovative one-year life skills program that helps young adults better understand what they want and build the skills they need to go out and get it. Students learn a variety of skills and have experiences that prepare them for life after their gap year, whether that be the workforce or a post-secondary program. Virtual info sessions are Feb. 13, Mar. 14, May 2, and May 22. Register here.
- Or check out <u>The Canadian Gap Year Association</u> for different options for a gap year after grade 12.
 Instead of an in-person year of activities, this organization has <u>several specific programs</u>.
- WorkSafe Saskatchewan provides residents of Saskatchewan with free, online health and safety education certification. This is a great opportunity to include in your resume when applying for a job. Courses include Bullying in the Workplace, Hazard Identification, Mental Health, Violence in the Workplace, WHMIS, and many others. Course descriptions are available. Once you go through the registration, and declare yourself as a Saskatchewan resident, your total cost will be zero dollars. You can then begin taking the courses you chose.
- Before someone from a university or technical school comes by your high school, have a look at these to prepare for post-secondary representatives.

FOR CWEX, CAREER ED., FIN. LIT., SCIENCE, PAA TEACHERS, CAREER COUNSELLORS: NEW STUFF

- It's time to select a nominee from your school for the Saskatchewan Youth Apprenticeship Industry Scholarship. There are 100 in the province, and the scholarship is \$1000. Selection criteria is:
 - The student must complete the SYA Program by August 31, 2024.
 - The student must be in Grade 12 and graduate from high school by August 31, 2024.
 - Nominated students will be selected based on their answers to the questions on the Scholarship Nominee Profile Form, so it is important that the student provide complete, accurate responses for this section; and
 - The graduate's post-secondary plans will be considered in the selection.

FOR CWEX, CAREER ED., FIN. LIT., SCIENCE TEACHERS, CAREER COUNSELLORS: OLD STUFF

- Changes to Career Safety Education: The Sask. Safety Council does not require participating students to take Young Workers' Readiness Course, but it remains a requirement of the Saskatchewan Government for those ages 14 and 15 only. Participants who enroll in Career Safety Education will be given sequential access to the following programs: New Worker Readiness, Mental Health Resiliency, WHMIS, Hearing Protection, Industry Elective(s) of choice. Once enrolled, Career Safety Education is an automated process whereby each course can only be accessed after the pre-requisite, or previous course, is completed. This makes the system much more efficient than previous versions. If your curriculum requires the completion of Young Workers Readiness, that is a separate requirement from our program and not related. If you prefer that your students take only a specific industry course(s), and not participate in the system as defined above, we can modify their registrations to allow different access, however some courses such as SCOT and WAVE would no longer be available to them.
 - There are **2 pathways** schools can choose to participate in our free training: **Career Safety Education Guided Pathway** This is a hands-off system that allows students to take 1
- Career Safety Education Guided Pathway This is a hands-off system that allows students to take 1 course at a time in a specific order to help build their knowledge at each step. It starts with New Worker Readiness, then Mental Health Resiliency, WHMIS, Hearing Protection and follows with an industry elective. This ensures the learner is building the knowledge at each step that can be used to help understand the next course content. (Note: New Worker Readiness is not the same as YWRCC offered by the Government of Saskatchewan, New Workers Readiness provides significantly more detail in understanding risk and safety within first jobs, YWRCC is a legal requirement for those aged 14 or 15 at the time of employment). To register for the Career Safety Education, complete the profile request form here.
- **Self-Learning Pathway** The learner is given access to all the free training, allowing them to pick and choose what courses to take based on what they need. This pathway is recommended for those that already have a foundational knowledge of workplace safety, risks, hazards, and control measures so they can comprehend the material in the courses. It is also the one used if you only want a single course or access to courses in a different sequence than is recommended. For all-access to the programs in the self-learning pathway, complete the profile request found here.

What teachers responsible for young workers need to know:

- Young Workers' Readiness Course is a single course that is required to work in Saskatchewan for those aged 14 and 15 only.
